Strategy of the Month

Introduce Groupwork to Your Students by Starting Small

Help your students feel more at ease when working in teams by introducing them to the assignment and to their team members before they get started. Giving students a chance to get to know their team members will create a sense of connection to one another and a shared sense of purpose. Providing low-stakes team assignments as practice will help to decrease the pressure students may feel when assigned a new and unfamiliar group assignment. These low-stakes practice activities also give them the confidence to work in teams regularly and on large-scale assignments.



Helpful Tip

Keep Your Team Sizes Intentional

The ideal size for groups depends on the type of assignment or activity. Quick, in-class activities used to interrupt and diversify lectures are generally most effective when done in pairs. In pairs, your students will feel more comfortable sharing their ideas and no one will be left out. Barkley, Cross, and Major suggest that groups of 3 will split into a pair leaving an outsider, and groups of 4 will split into 2 pairs.

The recommended group size for longer activities, or groups working together for the semester, is 5-7 (Barkley, Cross, & Major 2016; Farland, 2019). Ideally, the group is small enough that all students can engage and feel that their contributions are valued, while remaining large enough to ensure a diversity of thinkers without becoming unwieldy (Barkley, Cross, & Major 2016; Farland, 2019).

The Affordable UF Initiative recognizes faculty who are working to increase access to lower-cost course materials. Courses that adopt materials that cost less than \$20 per credit hour are eligible to earn an Affordable UF Badge, which allows students to easily identify courses with low- or no-cost materials. The process to apply has been simplified from past semesters. You can now submit your course for review during the textbook adoption process - simply enter your estimated textbook costs when prompted. Academies have openly acknowledged the importance of role models, but very little effort has been directed to address the negative psychological sequelae underrepresented individuals report and the effect that ongoing microaggressions have on their careers.
