Use a Course Map

When courses contain a lot of content it can be challenging to keep track of how each activity, assignment, and assessment helps your students master course goals. Using a course map can help you create alignment between each element and your course objectives. The course map is valuable as an organizational tool because it can help you ensure you've coordinated strategic placement of each facet of the learning experience. A course map can also be used to share the course's structure to others.

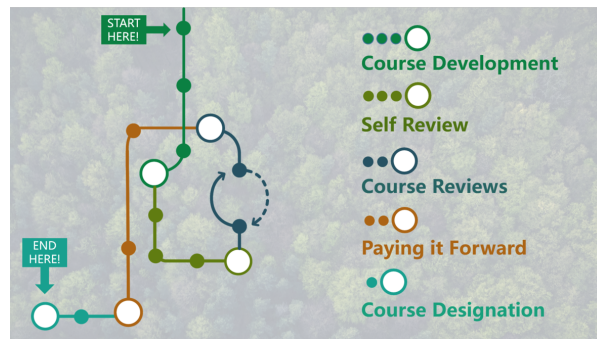

The Center for Teaching Excellence's *Course Reviews for Excellence Workshop* (CREW) is designed to provide guidance for participating in the [online course review process](#). This online training is applicable to UF instructor teams in all disciplines. Since it is asynchronous, you can complete the workshop at a pace that fits your schedule.



Upon completion, you will be able to:

1. Explain how the online course review process supports course
2. Describe the main elements of the UF+Quality Matters Rubric
3. Use the UF+Quality Matters Rubric to identify and describe evidence of good design and teaching practices in your course
4. Craft and submit a quality self-review

Allocate about 90 minutes to complete [Part 1 of the CREW](#) (Canvas login required). Allow more time if you would like to view the optional resources.

Helpful Tip

Use the UF + Quality Matters Rubric!

UF has fused the nationally recognized Quality Matters Higher Education Rubric Fifth Edition (Quality Matters, 2014) and the UF Teaching-Focused Standards to create a combined UF + Quality Matters rubric.

This rubric serves as the standard by which an online course's "high quality" performance indicator is measured (Center for Teaching Excellence, 2021). The rubric, which evaluators use as a standard means of measurement to assess the quality of an online course, includes 11 areas for evaluation of quality.

You can use it to:

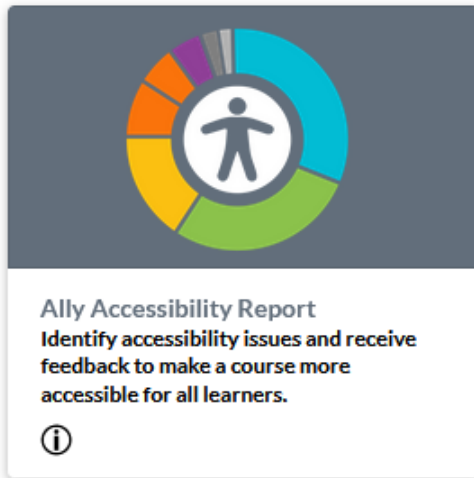
1. Inform the development process of new courses
2. Promote self-evaluation to revise and improve existing courses
3. Earn an online course quality designation
4. Be eligible for university and state recognition for well-developed courses

Use the Ally Accessibility Report Tool!



Ally is an instructor tool integrated into Canvas that supports instructors by ensuring materials they create and supply to students are accessible. Ally scans materials that have been uploaded into Canvas and displays a gauge that indicates whether an item has accessibility issues.

Once you click on the gauge you'll be walked through an explanation of any problems and guidance on fixing those problems. Ally gives each item an individual score (out of 100) and provides a total course score (also out of 100). Aim to reach a minimum accessibility score of 85% for your course.

You Can Now Apply for a Spring '22 Affordable UF Badge

During the Fall 2021 semester, the Affordable UF Badge was awarded to over 1000 UF course sections! The badge recognizes instructors who demonstrate a commitment to textbook affordability and signifies that the required materials in their courses cost less than \$20 per credit hour. It also appears in the student textbook portal, allowing students to easily identify courses with low- or no-cost materials.



The application for Spring 2022 badges is now open. **To apply for your own Affordable UF badge:**

1. Submit your textbook adoption at the [UF Textbook Adoption website](#). In order to be eligible for the badge, adoptions must be submitted and finalized before the textbook adoption deadline. **The Spring 2022 textbook adoption deadline is November 19, 2021.**
2. If you think your adoption meets the \$20 per credit hour threshold, enter the estimated textbook costs in the "Affordable UF" section at the end of the textbook adoption form, and click "next."
3. After you submit your textbook adoption the Center for Teaching Excellence will review your course.

If your course is eligible to receive the Affordable UF badge, you will be sent a digital copy of the designation. Your badge can also be displayed in many other places, including:

- your syllabus
- your Canvas site
- your email signature line
- digital resumes/ CVs
- social media
- your website
