HELPFUL TIP

Feedback is an essential component of the learning process, as it helps students understand what they are doing well and what areas they need to improve upon. When providing feedback, be sure to highlight specific examples of student achievement, such as well-written essays, insightful class contributions, or successful group projects. By recognizing and celebrating these achievements, you can help students feel valued and motivated to continue learning.

If you choose to showcase examples of student work with others, be sure to follow laws and guidelines for how to responsibly share these artifacts. Get student permission prior to sharing their work with colleagues or other students. Clearly explain the context, what they are granting permission for, and that their privacy and intellectual creations are honored.
